Welcome to the One Watershed, One Plan

The Missouri River Watershed One Watershed, One Plan (1W1P) is a collaborative project bringing 6 counties, 6 soil and water conservation districts and 2 watershed districts together to develop a comprehensive plan for resource management in the Missouri River Watershed.

This implementation-focused plan combines local entities that would otherwise have separate local plans into one combined planning effort to address resource issues in the Missouri River Watershed. The planning effort will be led locally and developed to put the right solutions in the right place. This means actions and investments are made where they make the most impact to protect or improve the resources that are most important locally.

What is a "Watershed"?

A watershed is the area of land where all the water that drains off of it goes into the same place—a river, stream, or lake.

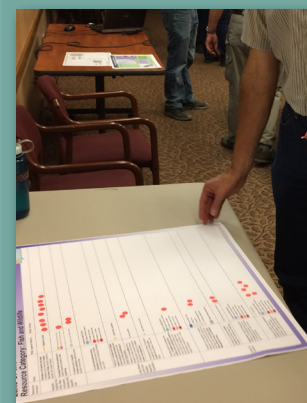
